## **Family Dollar** coming to town

The purchase of land at 514 S. Sixth St. was finalized earlier this month and plans are underway to build a Family Dollar store at the location.

Town codes administrator Fred Crosby confirmed the purchase and an application for a demolition permit for Overland Construction, a company based in Salt Lake City, Utah. According to Crosby, the store is one of six Family Dollar outlets being built in Wyoming.

Overland Construction Project Manager Dave Holman said building plans would be submitted to the town planning and zoning board this week.

Demolition at the corner of Sixth and Richards streets, across from Blair's Super Market, was scheduled to begin this week and should be completed before the end of the month. A 90-day building period is scheduled once plans are accepted.

## Dr. Manning contributed to community in countless ways

It's not often one finds a single person who exemplifies commu-

nity mindedness like the late Dr. Frank Manning.

Born in Denver, Colo., in 1931,

Manning spent much of his childhood in Montana and Washington State before coming to Thermopolis, where he graduated from high school in 1949.

He joined the Wyoming Army National Guard 300th Armored Field Artillery Battalion, Battery A, and served in Korea from

One of the most highly decorated artillery battalions, the 300th received a meritorious unit commendation and five presidential unit citations during 805 combat days in the Korean War.

Manning himself received the Bronze Star and a Purple Heart during his tour of duty.

According to Manning, they fired over 500,000 105mm rounds at 35 pounds each in Korea. They suffered 11 members killed in action, 172 wounded in action and eight prisoners

of war. The battalion has been credited with more than 19,000 enemy casualties.

He wrote of his experiences in Korea in his book, "Fire Missions and Cherry Blossoms."

He met his wife Jackie while attending dental school in Chicago at Northwestern Universi-

## Flooding possible from Owl

Hot Springs County became a real possibility Tuesday with an increase of flow from Anchor Dam west of Thermopolis.

According to emergency management director Bill Gordon, Anchor Dam was releasing approximately 420 cubic feet per second (cfs) on Tuesday morning. In order

to make room for run-off expected to come from the South Fork, the release amount was nearly doubled by Wednesday morning to 800 cfs.

"The South Fork really hasn't started moving yet," Gordon said. "We need to move the water out (of Anchor Dam)

to make room." In response to the possibility of Owl Creek leaving its banks, sandbags were made available to residents in the area through the road and bridge department.

Sand was brought in from Webb Road north of town, where it was being stored by the department. Bags could be filled at the road and bridge office and was also made available at Cozzen's Corner and the gravel pit on Jones Road.
