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#### Search and Rescue finds stranded pair of hunters

pair of hunters stranded above the Copper Mountain area.

When the two realized they were stuck, they called 911, but the call was sent by the cell phone tower to Washakie County first. Once dispatch realized they were actually in Hot Springs County, the call was forwarded here.

Search and Rescue was paged out at approximately 6:30 p.m. and two units were sent to the mountain to look for the pair along with five members of the team.

According to Search and Rescue head Chad Baldes, Chip Axtell, who owns land in the area, was significant in helping the rescuers through the area via cell phone.

At one point in the search, it was thought they might actually be in Fremont County and their rescue team was paged out as well. Fremont County Search and Rescue did not actually make it to the area before the pair were found.

Jim Joyner and Mike Robertson were the Search and Rescue team that eventually found the missing hunters.

Once found, father and son were in good condition, Baldes said.

They had food with them, water and heat, so things were fine," he said. "We tried to retrieve the truck, but ended up breaking our winch, so the guys brought them back to town."

In all, the search took about four hours to complete.

"I really want to thank everybody who called and helped guide us on this one," Baldes said. "I had a lot of people calling me on my cell phone to give us directions.'

## Cats capture another 2A state crown

Who would have thought the high-powered Big Horn offense would be held without a touchdown in the Class 2A football state championship game Saturday at War Memorial Stadium in Laramie?

The Thermopolis defense did just that, limiting the Rams to three field goals en route to repeating as state champions with a 13-9 victory on Jonah Field. It was the culmination of a stellar 10-1 season and prevented top-ranked Big Horn from completing an unbeaten year.

It was the Cats' sixth football state title. Thermop was the state champ three years in a row, from 1990-92. The first crown came in 1932 with a 26-7 win over Kemmerer in Thermopolis.

Thermop's win in the state title game last weekend avenged the only loss by the Cats this season. Big Horn rolled to a 42-7 win over the Cats in the fifth game of the year. Since then, Thermop reeled off six straight wins, including a 53-0 blanking of Lyman in the first round of the state playoffs and a 39-15 victory over Lovell in the semifinals.

With the Cats and Rams averaging a combined

790 yards a game, a high-scoring game was expected by many, but it was Thermop's defense that kept the Cats in the contest. Twice the Cats held Big Horn inside the 20-yard-line in the first half, forcing successful field goals by Colby Wollenman.

Needing a touchdown and extra point to take the lead, the Cats did just that - marching 71 yards in just more than a minute. Senior quarterback Mitch Syverson scored on a one-yard run and senior Kyle Larson kicked the conversion for a 7-6 Thermop lead with 19 seconds left in the first half.

Neither team scored in the third period, setting the stage for a dramatic fourth-quarter finish.

After a Thermop punt, Big Horn took over at its own 45 and moved the ball inside the Cats' 10-yardline. Again the Cats' defense held and the Rams settled for a 30-yard field goal by Wollenman with 6:55 remaining in the game.

With perhaps only one possession to take the lead, Thermop mounted a 75-yard drive – converting on third down four times, twice on passes from Syverson to senior Jacob Brown and runs by Syverson and Kyle Pebbles.

To cap Thermop's most time-consuming drive of the season, Syverson scored on a five-yard run to give the Cats a 13-9 lead with just 1:03 to play. The conversion pass was incomplete, but the touchdown forced Big Horn to get into the end zone instead of going for a game-winning field goal.

Big Horn quickly moved into Thermop territory after the kickoff, but sophomore Christian Syverson and Pebbles combined for a big defensive play. Syverson pressured Wollenman, whose off-balance pass was picked off by Pebbles to seal the win.

It was a thrilling but tiring day for the throng of Thermop students who climbed aboard the booster bus at 4 a.m. Saturday for the 10 o'clock kickoff. The support by those students and the faithful parents and other fans that made the trip to Laramie – including the pep band and cheerleaders - truly made a difference in the game. The outcome made it a joyous ride home. Central Bank & Trust, Big Horn Federal, Pinnacle Bank and Bank of Thermopolis shared the cost of the booster bus.
