

## **HSCGLF receives Gov. Arts Award**

Hot Springs Greater Learning Foundation has been awarded a prestigious Wyoming Governor's Arts Award for bringing the arts to Thermopolis. In his acknowledgement letter, Governor Matt Mead commented, "You make it look easy to bring the arts to a rural location -- you have done it and done it well for a long time.

The Foundation was nominated for the Award by Meri Ann Rush, executive director for Thermopolis Chamber of Commerce. "I nominated the Foundation for the Award not only because of their dedication to the arts in Thermopolis but because of their dedication to the youth of Hot Springs County," Rush explained.

Other recipients include Cedric Reverand and Paul Taylor of Laramie, Chris Navarro and Brian Scott Gamroth of Casper and Sarah Rogers of Sundance. They will be honored at the annual Governor's Arts Awards Gala in Cheyenne, February 26, 2016.

'Our goal has always been to listen to people in the community, hear what they would like to do and if it sounds like a good idea, figure out a way to make it happen," said Sue Blakey, who is Foundation director.

One of the first outreach programs was the music jams, which have been going now for over 10 years. "We wanted a regular time to get together and play informally," said Ed Capen,

The jams were just the beginning. "We wanted to bring in artists and performers, but there was no way to do so without a partner," said Jacky Wright, owner of Broadway Bygones, and the Foundation's education director. Grizzly bear

may be near

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is expected to issue a draft proposal as early as the opening months of 2016 recommending the delisting of the Yellowstone grizzly bear from the Endangered Species Act.

Fish and Wildlife authorities believe the Yellowstone grizzly population is recovered and is considering whether to move forward with a delisting proposal according to Serena Baker. a public affairs specialist with Fish and Wildlife Mountain-

Once the long awaited proposal is issued, it will be subject to public comment and possible

The proposal will need to address how the species will be protected in the future so population numbers stay at accept

Organizations such as the Sierra Club are strong opponents of the delisting claiming population growth as slowed.

Native American tribes question the delisting if it leads to bear hunting seasons. They believe the grizzly bear is sacred and should not be hunted. Officials from the Game and Fish feel strongly that they can manage grizzlies successfully, citing black bear and mountain lion management success. They believe there is a surplus of grizzlies because they have expanded outside the Demographic Management Area. Game and Fish officials say they would aim for a target number of 674 grizzly bears within the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem with the population not dipping down to even 600 bears. ## Hot Springs County 2015 Year in Review

**JANUARY** 

January 1, 2015: Thermopolis received a staggering 18 inches of snow on top of an already eight inch base clogging streets and driveways, creating a mess of stuck vehicles and several fender benders as folks tried to get around.

Wyoming Department of Transportation, Hot Spring County and Town of Thermopolis road crews worked throughout Christmas Day struggling to even keep up with the snow.

January 8, 2015: After being sworn in as Mayor, Mike Mortimore used his power of appointment to shape his administration.

Mortimore appointed Steve Shay to be Chief of Police and Ron Jurovich to be municipal court judge.

Shay replaced Mike Chimenti, who Mortimore said resigned his position Dec. 15 but has been

working as acting chief since. Jurovich replaced the current

municipal court judge Jill Logan. January 15, 2015: The Hot Springs State Park Master Plan Steering Committee met for the first time to discuss the purpose of a master plan for the state park, and to discuss issues and opportunities that the park has.

The purpose of the meeting was to start talking about what the fu-

Approximately 20 local business owners and residents make up the committee.

The master plan for the state park should take around 15 months to complete. Having started work in September 2014, the master plan should be completed by the end of 2015.

January 22, 2015: Hot Springs County joined counties across the state by giving out its first same-sex marriage license to a couple from Natrona County.

Maureen Stanton and Denise Dozan applied for their marriage license on their way to visit family.

Following a federal court ruling where the court found that Wyoming's ban on same-sex marriages was unconstitutional, the state started issuing licenses.

Wyoming is one of 37 states that currently recognize samesex marriages.

February 5, 2015: The Hot Springs County Commissioners accepted the resignation of Hot Springs County Fire Warden, Jay DuVall during their meeting.

According to his resignation letter, his job and other circumstances do not allow him to dedicate the time to the position that

County attorney and volunteer fireman Jerry Williams said the fire department is aware of the resignation and they are in the process of looking through their ranks to find a replacement they can recommend to the commissioners for appointment.

February 12, 2015: During the Town Council meeting, council members extended the term length of appointed personnel from two to four years.

Mayor Mike Mortimore suggested the change, saying that a two year term is sometimes not long enough to get things accomplished

The Mayor can still remove appointed personnel from their post at any point.

February 19, 2015: A single vehicle rollover on Feb. 14 resulted in the death of 60-year-old Douglas Hugh Whitt of Kirby.
