

PUBLIC NOTICE

Pursuant to the Wyoming Administrative Procedure Act and the Wyoming Public Service Commission’s (Commission) Rules and Regulations, notice is hereby given of the Application of Rocky Mountain Power (RMP or the Company) for a waiver of the solicitation requirements for a significant energy resource and acknowledgement of the power purchase agreement, as more fully described below.

1. RMP is a division of PacifiCorp, an Oregon corporation engaged in the business of supplying electric utility service to customers throughout its six-state service territory, including Wyoming under certificates of public convenience and necessity issued by the Commission. RMP is a public utility subject to the Commission’s jurisdiction. Wyo. Stat. §§37-1-101(a)(vi)(C) and 37-2-112.

2. On October 22, 2025, the Company filed an Application requesting a waiver of the solicitation process in Wyoming Statute § 37-2-136(b) and acknowledgement of the Company’s power purchase agreement (PPA) with US SFR Owner, LLC, a subsidiary of TerraPower (US SFR) for nuclear energy from the Natrium commercial demonstration plant (the KU1 project). RMP states the PPA and KU1 project constitute a time-sensitive commercial and technical opportunity to obtain cost-effective generation that will provide benefits to Wyoming customers. Wyoming Statute § 37-2-136(c) permits a waiver if the Commission determines that waiving the requirement is “in the public interest because of a clear emergency, a time limited commercial or technical opportunity that provides value to the customers of the affected electrical utility or any other factor determined by the [C]ommission that makes waiving the requirement in the public interest.” RMP has also requested approval of an asset sale based on the water rights use and conveyance agreement related to and required for the PPA to take full effect, in a separate docket.

3. Per the Application, the KU1 project represents a unique, time limited opportunity as it is the inaugural Natrium demonstration facility, making the PPA structure inherently unique and time limited. This opportunity allows TerraPower to prove its first-of-a-kind asset without passing construction cost overruns or technology performance risks to customers. The KU1 project’s location adjacent to existing company infrastructure creates site-specific benefits that the Company believes are in the public interest.

5. Anyone desiring to file a public comment, statement, intervention petition, protest or request for a public hearing in this matter must file with the Commission in writing on or before December 11, 2025. Petitions shall set forth the grounds of the proposed intervention or request for hearing as well as the position and the interest of the petitioner in this proceeding. COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

The Thermopolis Town Council met in regular session on November 4, 2025, at 7 pm at Town Hall. Present were Mayor Adam Estenson, Council members Tony Larson, John Dorman Sr., Rachel Hughes, and Dusty Lewis. Also present were Mayor/Codes Administrative Assistant Jim Jeunehomme, Clerk/Treasurer Tracey Van Heule, Police Chief Pat Cornwell, Public Works Director Basil Sorensen, Town Engineer Anthony Barnett and Town Attorney Marshall Keller.

AGENDA: Following the pledge of allegiance, Dorman made a motion, seconded by Lewis and carried to approve the agenda as presented.

MINUTES: Hughes made a motion, seconded by Dorman and carried to approve the Council meeting minutes from October 7 and 21, 2025 and the executive session minutes from October 21, 2025.

BILLS: Lewis made a motion and Larson seconded to approve the General, Enterprise and Special Fund bills for October 2025. Hughes asked about the Indeed bill and a bill for flower bed supplies. All voted aye, motion carried.

CITIZEN PARTICIPATION: BIG HORN BASIN NATURE & DISCOVERY CENTER BOARD APPOINTMENT: Jeunehomme noted only one application was received. Larson made a motion, seconded by Dorman and carried to appoint Frank Lambrick to a 3-year term on the Big Horn Basin Nature & Discovery Center Board.

VFW POST COMMANDER BRAD BECERRA – VETERANS OUTREACH: Becerra voiced his concerns about how the town communicates changes to citizens. He mentioned the addition of stop signs on Arapahoe and the school and the fireworks after the recent playoff football games. He noted due to the lack of communication, many combat veterans were unaware and were impacted by the mortar rounds. He asked that the fireworks be relocated and asked for improved communication in how citizens are notified. He then presented a video on PTSD and the effects on the brain. Estenson noted he would work with the fire department and booster club about relocating the mortar rounds.

CITIZEN PARTICIPATION: MAIRAM ERKINBAEVA: FIREWORKS COMPLAINT: Ms. Erkinbaeva noted on October 31, while supervising her trick or treating children, near 14th street, the first mortar went off. She noted the noise and vibration startled children and herself. She also noted she experienced lingering personal effects from the noise

and vibration. She asked the Mayor and Council to use noiseless fireworks. Her husband, John Waid also asked that the detonation be moved away from Arapahoe Street, as he owns a rental unit at 327 Arapahoe and several elderly tenants were upset with the noise.

DEPARTMENT REPORTS: The following reports were available for review: police, engineering, streets and alleys, water, wastewater, sanitation and landfill. Cornwell noted there were 12 calls received about the fireworks. Hughes asked about filling the Animal Control officer position. Cornwell noted he is concentrating on filling the open patrol and dispatch positions, first. Sorensen noted the Owl Creek line was fixed and there was a water break on Warren Street. The Warren street line was lead and has been replaced. Hughes asked about replacing the small, yellow children at play signs. Sorensen noted he recently placed a sign order. Barnett noted asphalt may not be able to be installed at the Broadway Bridge and the State of Wyoming is looking for an alternate.

ADMINISTRATION: MEL ROBINSON RETIREMENT: Estenson noted Melody Robinson, the Chief Wastewater Plant Operator is retiring after 47 years with the Town.

ADMINISTRATION: HEALTH CARE RENEWAL: Jeunehomme noted the Town’s health insurance renewal increased 14%. Nationwide the average increase is 11%. He noted the Town had to lock in the rate, as of October 31. Lewis made a motion, seconded by Larson and carried to move forward with the option selected by administration.

MAYOR AND COUNCIL: LOCAL GOVERNMENT LIABILITY POOL: BOARD MEMBER ELECTION: Lewis made a motion and Dorman seconded to cast the town’s LGLP ballot for Brad Basse. Hughes noted she would like to see someone new. Voting aye were Larson, Dorman and Lewis, Hughes voted no, motion carried.

MAYOR & COUNCIL: CAPTAIN HILAN ERNEST JONES PROCLAMATION: Estenson read the proclamation that declared November 12, 2025, Hilan Ernest Jones day in Thermopolis.

MAYOR & COUNCIL: CHRISTMAS HOLIDAY DESIGNATION: Larson made a motion, seconded by Hughes and carried to approve December 26, 2025 as the additional Christmas holiday.

MAYOR & COUNCIL: OTHER: At 7:56pm, Dorman made a motion, seconded by Larson and carried to adjourn. The next council meeting is November 18, 2025, at 7pm.

NOTICE OF PUBLIC MEETING

The Town of Thermopolis, Wyoming, will conduct a public meeting at 7:00pm local time on December 16th, 2025, at the Town of Thermopolis Town Hall. The purpose of the meeting is to allow citizens to review and comment on the following project.

The Town of Thermopolis, WY Lead Service Line Investigation & Replacement Project

This project includes pothole excavation of treated water service lines with unknown material types and replacing service lines that are lead or “galvanized requiring replacement”. Due to EPA lead service line requirements, all public water systems are expected to identify each unknown water service line material visually and include that information in an inventory filed with the EPA and made available for public record. Following the identification of all unknown service lines, any service line that is lead or “galvanized requiring replacement” per EPA standards will then be replaced from the main to the point of transition to the building’s interior plumbing. This project will allow the Town of Thermopolis to comply fully with EPA Lead Service Line requirements. Any excavation or replacement work performed on this project will be performed at previously disturbed locations where existing water service lines are already in place and serving customers. The unknown service lines that will be excavated are located throughout the Town limits. Those that will require replacement will be determined following the completion of the identification phase of the project. Project completion is expected in 2027, depending on funding availability.

At the meeting, the Town of Thermopolis will present the preliminary design of the proposed project and will discuss
