

School board candidates answer questions

Teachers, parents and community members gathered Tuesday night for a Candidates Forum featuring the six people who are vying for three seats on the School Board.

Kendi Heinze, Daniel Pebbles, Sherman Skelton, Jennifer Axtell, Rick Englebrecht and Ronda Freel were on hand to answer a series of questions created by the Wyoming Board of Education.

Each of the candidates were given the time to introduce themselves and give their reasons for running for one of the open seats.

Sherman Skelton – A fifth generation resident of the county, Skelton said it is something altogether different to teach other chil-

dren, giving praise to the staff at all of the schools. He said his love for community runs deep and would like to continue to serve the community on the board.

Rick Englebrecht – Englebrecht, after a stint in the Air Force, began an engineering career, moving to Thermopolis in 1995. Passionate about public education, he helps out at the Shoshoni school when he can. He has taught adult education classes and is an advocate for kids and grandkids and wants to do the best for employees and community.

Ronda Freel – Freel has spent 34 of her 35 years teaching right here in Thermopolis. She has worked at all of the different schools in the district and feels its time for her to get

back into helping the kids and the community.

Kendi Heinze – Originally from Kaycee, Heinze has been living here the past eight years. A graduate of Chadron State College, Heinze has been the executive director of the EDC and currently works at Central Bank and Trust as a loan officer. She is an advocate for the children and believes they deserve the best education we can offer them.

Jennifer Axtell – Axtell has been on the board for the past four years and has a vested interest in the district’s success. She has participated in board activities, presented on the state and national level and talked to legis-

Airport apron expansion project funding discussed

The Hot Springs Board of County Commissioners met on Tuesday afternoon and discussed an application for supplemental funding for an apron expansion project at the airport.

In talking with TO Engineers, the commissioners learned chances of getting the grant look to be about 50/50 at this time, but more money is coming down in the next three years.

The grant would be a 100 percent grant amounting to about \$3 million, however, that is one of the smaller projects WYDOT and the FAA are looking at, so it could help our chances of getting on the list.

Every five years the county has to provide a request for quote (RFQ) for engineering services for the county as well as planning services. The board approved an RFQ and it will appear in the Casper paper for three weeks. Submissions will be reviewed in November and services granted the first part of December.

Chris Schmeltzer with Park County Implement of Cody was on hand to offer the county another great deal on leasing certain equipment needed for the airport and the courthouse.

Although the price of the lease has gone up, airport FBO Nate Messenger and Maintenance Supervisor Anthony Fruciano both agreed the equipment was much needed and helped them save a lot of time.

The commissioners approved the lease of two John Deere implements for the coming year.

A bid for replacing the roofing over the walk-in cooler at the Senior Center was approved as well.

Patterson Construction will be doing the project for \$8,880 with funding coming out of the original SLIB funding that allowed the replacement of the Senior Center roof.

The Pioneer Association approached the commissioners on Tuesday about purchasing the log house and property that is to the west of the museum.

Ray Shaffer, speaking for the association, told the commissioners they are considering the purchase, but have not made anything official as yet.

If they pursue the purchase, they would rent the home on the piece of property for a time to help pay off the loan for the purchase, and then would tear it down so it could be used as an annex to the museum.

If purchased, it would allow them to put a French drain in between the two property lines, abating the issue with water getting into the basement of the museum. A structure could be built on the property to house artifacts as well.

This would put the property in the hands of the county and the commissioners were not opposed to the purchase and felt it would be a good way to expand the museum down the road.

Girls cross country team takes state
